
An extremely humble personality who rarely talks about his achievements yet his accomplishments have crowned him an outstanding professional in Nigeria today.

WASIU ADEDAMOLA OLASUNKANMI AKEWUSOLA

onour is meant for those who deserve it. It is only a foolish man that looks down on a traditional ruler because a king is loaded with authority whether he exercises it or not, and whoever dares the king will pay dearly for it. Wasiu Adedamola Olasunkanmi Akewusola was born without a silver spoon but he built a factory where silver spoons are carved in thousands.

This principled and cultured gentleman shaped himself as an icon of reckoning and when most of his age mates were crying of lack of opportunity, he created one and used the moment. He discovered that he was not created to crawl, he dusted himself from the mud, spread his wings and flew, soaring beyond the reach of ordinary mist. His name is a key due to his pedigree and devotion to Islamic tenets and doctrines. He is an avowed Moslem but a liberal and godly man and in his professional calling, Quantity Surveying, his mark is glaring like a passing of an elephant on the grass.

Have you seen a man of policy before? Meet Alhaji Akewusola and you will discover that elephant is beyond a load to be lifted by two hefty men. Talk to him and you will discover a man who singlehandedly cultivated a plantation that will take 1,000 men to plough in 10 years.





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In this piece, Mr. Wasiu Akewusola spoke to our correspondents, Lanre Olusunmade and Yomi-Abayomi Olakanmi on his life from birth to the throne. Excerpts below:

I want to congratulate you on your retirement after meritorious years of service to the government and people of Lagos State. How do you feel retiring and celebrating your 60th birthday at the same time?

I feel fulfilled. It is a day I have been looking forward to because there were issues that happened in the system that would make you pray, "God, help me through this journey. Help me retire successfully without any blemish." There are many people who were hired the same time I was employed. Some fizzled out, some got tired and left, some were forcefully retired, others were sacked and death took some. If I am one of the people that God gave the privilege to leave ceremoniously, I should be grateful to Almighty Allah for everything by saying, "Alhamdu-Lillahi robil 'alamin." I feel fulfilled.

At 60, how do you feel – older or younger?

Well, I have not seen the difference between age 6 and age 60. I just see myself doing the normal activities I am supposed to be doing – sleeping and waking up, eating and drinking, going out and coming in – except that I see myself more as a person with responsibilities to others, as a husband, father and a leader.

Looking back to the time you joined the Civil Service in 1991, did it ever cross your mind that you would one day become a Permanent Secretary?

I started my service at a

government parastatal, Lagos State Development and Property Corporation (LSDPC) and the highest level you can attain in that place is to become the Managing Director. I never envisaged it but as God would have it, I headed the parastatal and another parastatal and then became a Permanent Secretary. Honestly, it never crossed my mind that I would be a Permanent Secretary when I was joining the service. All I dreamt about was to do everything within my purview as excellently as I could.

Tell us your concise history

Before I was born, I was a very gentle and noiseless person in the womb of my mother. In those days, the elders would sit with children on a mat outside, narrating tales by moonlight – and on the very day I was born, a Friday, the 22^{nd} day of June 1962, my pregnant mother was narrating the story of Late Chief Obafemi Awolowo. She felt the pangs of birth – I think her water broke and she just excused herself. At Akerele Private Maternity Hospital, Odi-Olowo, Lagos State, she was ushered into a labour room and a boy was added into the family of Alhaji Hamzah Sadiq and Alhaja Rayhanat Abebi Akewusola, both of blessed memory. The only child that came through a private Hospital in the family. My coming to life was so easy because there was no stress for my mother. The growing up was not that rosy in a family of 12 children, two wives and a father with limited income. My father, before he died said to us, 'if not for Awolowo, none of you would have gone to school.' I am the fifth child of my mother and

seventh of my father. Each wife had six children; meaning after me, my mother had one more and her mate added four to the family. The most awesome thing is that each wife had four boys and two girls. My mother being the first wife had given birth to four before the new additions and all the income had been channelled towards the training of the older ones, thereby causing acrimony. To resolve the situation, my father later decided to sponsor the eldest child of each wife in the family, and those ones would later help their younger siblings. Therefore, my elder siblings were saddled with the responsibility of sponsoring my education. I started very well in primary school. I attended Saint Paul's Anglican Primary School, Idi-Oro in Alakara, I was born at Giwa Street, Odi Olowo in Mushin. Many people believe that people from that axis are thugs but I am a proud 'Mushine' and a Permanent Secretary of a Ministry in Lagos State. I spent seven years in primary school. In my time we were supposed to spend eight years in elementary school - two infant years and six standard years but in my Infant 2, the system was changed from Standard to Primary and those of us in Infant 2 were taken to Primary I and I finished my primary school and sat for my First School Leaving Certificate on June 22nd, 1974.

After my primary school, I had to stop due to the "traffic jam" in my family. Those who were supposed to sponsor me were still in secondary school.

I have a brother, Col. Rasheed Akewusola (rtd) who is nine months older than me. We both finished primary school the same time. He



was also held up in the artificial traffic jam. My father expressed the opinion that we should complete our Arabic School before we could proceed to secondary school. Unknown to us, it was just a gimmick my father devised for us to stay calm till our elders would be buoyant enough to sponsor our education.

We were so quick at scaling the hurdle of going to Arabic School and finishing within a year. Several entrance forms for Secondary schools were coming out and we were not given the opportunity to obtain any.

One of our teachers invited our parents to educate them on the need to send us to the high school because of our academic prowess. Our dad went for the meeting but we did not know what was discussed or what transpired. We only knew we were not given a kobo to take any form. There was this teacher in my primary school who gave us a counsel that sticks with me to date. He was the Chairman of the Send Forth Committee. He said, "Some of you will go to secondary school even further to higher institutions and some of you would have to learn a craft or trade – but in all, don't choose a profession that will not give you fortune and fame." When he said that, I looked at myself from head to toe and asked myself, 'Where do I belong?'. Honestly, at that time, learning a trade or craft was never on my mind but I resigned to fate – went to the Madrasah and I completed my studies within a year. After completing that segment, I went to ask my father of his next plan for me and he told us to learn and absorb the translation and meaning of Quran – and that would take another one year or more to grab. My morale went down and I lost

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> interest in studying further Arabic. My mother then revealed to me the reality of my life.

She said, "You won't go to secondary school. Rasheed will go and you will stay behind and learn a skill. Let me know a trade that fascinates you."

I was so devastated. That news crushed my soul and I began to cry and couldn't sleep throughout the night. The only thing on my mind was to go to secondary school, and all my older maternal siblings were still in secondary school or trying to find their footings in life and there was no extra money to add me to the budget.

The next morning, my elder sister, Alhaja Ni'mot Titilayo Okewande called me and said, "Wasiu, don't worry, you will go to secondary school. Myself and mama will join our resources to ensure you go to secondary school".

As soon as she said that to me and

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encouraged me to take any entrance form of an approved secondary school of my choice, I sprang into action. Whenever I saw anyone wearing white uniform, I would ask questions. That was the commonest uniform of secondary schools in those days, I would ask, "Is your entrance form out?" Each time I found a school, she would tell me it was unapproved until Lagos State Common Entrance forms came out, Rasheed and I took the form and chose Zumratul Islamiyyah Grammar School. Luckily, we were both admitted in 1976 after staying at home for about two years. When we got to the school, we were neither the youngest nor the oldest. There were other students who fell in our category and there were some privileged kids who looked like babies – but fortunately for me and my brother, we were the ones dictating the pace from Form one to five.

We were both active members of Muslim Students' Society and we represented the school in various Quiz competitions and won many prizes. There was this Islamic Religious Knowledge teacher of ours, Alhaji Rasheed Akinsanmi Ibrahim who was so fond of us – but he was always being taunted by other teachers for taking us to Islamic gatherings, instead of allowing us to concentrate on our studies.

We were school prefects and leaders of the Muslim Students' Society (MSS) in our final year. I was the Library Prefect and President of MSS while Rasheed was the Religious Prefect and the Imam of the Society. Fortunately, enough, when our WAEC result came out, our



teacher was the one that brought our results to our house – and both of us had the best results in the school.

The last paper I wrote in WAEC was Statistics and it was on June 22nd 1981. Can you see the great connection I have with June and 22nd day of that month?

After then, we had the next hurdle to scale and my sister promised me that she would support me to any level I so desired to reach academically but my half-brother, Rasheed would need to face that challenge squarely.

I went to Federal School of Arts and Science, Victoria Island for my HSC. My brother and I took JAMB forms and sat for Nigerian Defence Academy exams. We were told that government would be responsible for our training fees at NDA but when I looked at myself, I knew I was carved to be a civilian professional not a man in uniform. All the juicy package offered by NDA was good for my brother but not for me. Our names were published in the newspaper and the requirements for new students were stated clearly. As my brother was running helter-skelter to meet

the needs, I was busy going to the library to refresh my brain for the Advanced Level activities. My brother left for Kaduna, I continued my studies at Federal School of Arts and Science, and when JAMB result came out, I was admitted at the great University of Ife while my brother gained admission to the Federal University of Technology, Minna. I quickly dashed to the Post Office to send a telegram to my brother that our admissions were through at our various universities of choice. I told him I would be heading to Ife for Quantity Surveying.

He didn't reply but when he came back on holiday, I asked if he saw my telegram. He laughed and said yes and I asked why he didn't reply. He said his Commandant was the one that received the message and all messages were censored- to know maybe it was a news of a dead relation so that they might find an appropriate way of breaking the news to whoever owns the message.

They gave him the information in the telegram and they asked him if he would love to go - and he replied, no. That was how he

continued with his military training while I kept pursuing my training in Quantity Surveying.

I spent five years in Ife. I was supposed to graduate in June 1987 but I eventually left the school in August because of an incident that happened then that led to the shutting down of our school for a while. It was during Babangida era when some students went on rampage and some prisoners were freed by the students.

After completing my degree, I went for my NYSC. I cannot say I was one hundred per cent academically inclined because I was involved in some extracurricular activities such as Man O' War and Muslim Students' Society.

Why did you choose Ife for your university education and why **Quantity Surveying?**

Ordinarily, I should have gone to Unilag being a Lagos boy, and knowing the nooks and crannies of Akoka as a secondary school student when I used to go there for most of the activities, I told you about. There was a time I visited Ife and I was wowed by the expanse of land I saw at Ife, the nature and structure of the school captivated me. University of Ife was beautiful. It was a pride of our nation and what can be termed a real university. I went there recently, and the school is now a shadow of itself due to poor maintenance.

On my choice of course, one of our mentors at MSS, Alhaji Abdur-Razak Ayeni who had just completed his MSc in Mathematics at the time advised me against my original intention of choosing Chemical Engineering. He knew my background and advised me to go for a professional course. A course

that I can practise on my own instead of being at the mercy of an employer. He introduced me to Environmental Sciences courses. I prayed about it and God revealed to me that Quantity Surveying was good for me and I even got a revelation that I was in Ife – and that was why I chose Ife and Quantity Surveying.

What was your experience at Ife like?

I don't know the academic standard in recent times but in our time. Ife was a hell. If you have 3rd Class in Ife, you can have Ist Class in other universities. The benchmark was high. You hardly see someone scoring 70 or more and if you scored 40, you are in the range of having 60 plus in other places. Many things happened that you cannot even explain but in all, if you graduated when you were supposed to, consider yourself wonderful and lucky. Having a re-sit or repeat in Ife is a normal thing. Spending six to seven years to complete a 4-year course is not abnormal in Ife. Nobody will look down on you. Ife is a tough school even for the toughest students. People would even boast during arguments that, "This is my sixth year in this school ... in 19 so and so when this and that were presidents of Students Union or Prof so and so was VC," to claim supremacy over other debaters.

school, not because the students are poor academically or shallow minded but because the school system was built in a way to adapt you to very strict rigor and structure you to be academically strong. Who will dare mock the other person when you don't even know your fate because those with Grade One Distinction in secondary school are still battling with 3^{rd} Class in Ife. The rigour is quite much. Sometimes during the harmattan season, some lecturers might just fix lectures for 7am – and the distance between the halls of residence and lecture rooms is long and the weather would be freezing cold. Harmattan in Ife is colder than Lagos harmattan. Looking back at everything, I am grateful to God.

Repetition is a thing of pride in that



How did University of Ife shape your professional life?

You cannot be trained under such an environment and fail to excel. The school prepared me for eventualities. When I attended Unilag for my Masters, the 12months programme in Building, the training I had was quite simple compared to what I went through at lfe. Despite the fact that I was working and I was serving as the Secretary of Technical Committee at LSDPC, I was able to successfully complete my programme at the stipulated time of 12 months. Although some of my classmates considered the period to be too short and they couldn't meet the requirement for passing the grade but because of the experience I had at lfe, I scaled through.

After your compulsory NYSC service year at Akwa Ibom, you became a lecturer; what informed your decision?

I did my NYSC in three states - quite unprecedented. My call-up letter read Cross-River and I reported there. I was taken to Uyo for my service and during that time, Akwa blom was carved out of Cross River and because I was not satisfied with the rural area I was taken to, I went back to Calabar to complain and I was brought back to Cross-River State. When I was still not pleased with the situation there, I requested to be deployed to Lagos, and it was granted. I completed my service at the then Ministry of Works and Transport. So, I served in Cross-River, Akwa-Ibom and Lagos States. After I completed my service in July 1988, I lost my father in August 1988. As at that time, I was having my degree certificate, NYSC

certificate but no job certificate. I didn't want anyone to sympathise with me because among all my siblings, I was the only one having that problem. All others were engaged in one thing or the other. My half-brother, Rasheed had already been commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant. My younger siblings were in school and elderly ones were working. I was the only one unengaged.

After the burial rites, the family members that supported us began to ask questions on what we were doing, I was the only one that said, "I'm still searching for job." I said to myself, looking for job is embarrassing for me. I told my elder sister, my sponsor, that whatever job that comes my way, I would do. I saw an advert in the newspaper, Sokoto State Polytechnic, Birnin-Kebbi (now Kebbi State) was looking for Quantity Surveying lecturers; I

looking for a Quantity Surveyor. I also applied for the position. The funny thing about that particular job was that I received my invitation letter on the day of interview. I wondered what would happen if a letter was to be sent to me that my mother died. Is this how it will take a long time to reach my end? Soon after that, there was another advert from Ondo State Polytechnic seeking for lecturers. I applied, put our Lagos home address on the envelope and left Sokoto immediately to await the response to my letter in Lagos. When I got to Lagos, I saw another

advert of LSDPC requiring the services of Quantity Surveyor, Estate Surveyor, Architect, Electrical Engineers and PRO. I also applied. I went to Owo for an interview and I was given the opportunity to work. I shelved Sokoto job, started work in Owo and expecting something better to come from

checked the gualifications needed and I saw that I was gualified, I applied and was taken. I was working as a lecturer when I saw another advert of Ondo State University, Directorate of Works

Lagos.

While on that job, LSDPC also called me for an interview, I went and was taken. The funniest thing about all these movements was that Sokoto's salary outweighed Owo's

salary while that of Owo was better than that of LSDPC. I made up my mind to join LSDPC in 1991.

How did you fit into the Civil Service because you were coming from academic environment?

I left academics because I feel that its activities are too routine and monotonous. I'm sorry if any academician is following my story. I never considered it challenging doing the same thing all year round, year in and year out. In Sokoto, I was given eight hours a week and after then, nothing more. The place was so boring because I had no friends except an lfe mate that also took an employment there as well. Owo too was not quite different except for the language and its closeness to Lagos. I would prepare my lesson note and repeat the same for another academic session. What is challenging in that? My heart longed for something that will stretch my mind to think deep. Academic environment denied me the opportunity to express myself and it denied me the ability to display my potential.

Maybe if the opportunity to lecture had come in Lagos, I might not resign because Lagos lecturers also practise but how many jobs are there to do in those two other states where I had lectured. Looking at your career at LSDPC, you were promoted from Quantity Surveyor Grade 2 to Deputy General Manager (Project) within a very short time. Was this as a result of hard work or godfather? I don't consider that a short time; it was 1991 to 2014 - that is 23 years gap.

Could you take us through some challenges and gang-up you faced at



LSDPC and how did you overcome them?

several people with various activities. If your activities complement mine, we'll be friends but if it contradicts my policy, I would greet you from afar. We cannot relate. When Mr. Ambode became the Governor, he made some changes at the executive and management levels. The mantle of leadership now fell on some 'anyhow category of people.' Within that category, one person was selected to head the agency. The person selected, according to Civil Service ranking was not supposed to be the head. I had no issue against him. I walked up to him and congratulated him. I said, "This is our time ... this opportunity will not slip off our hands and I want to promise you that you have my support 100 per cent." Heads of LSDPC have always been outsiders. It was the first time we were having our own people at the helm of affairs. We were contemporaries and we had senior directors who were more gualified at the time but he was the one favoured by God to lead. Activities commenced and I realised that most of his doings were against me. Rather than make noise, I went


Naturally at LSDPC, there are

solo. I wouldn't respond to what

would affect me officially or taint my records. He now requested that I should be deployed to the State Secretariat.

When we were made Deputy GMs, I had to acknowledge one man, Mr. Bakare (aka Iron Man), he said to me, "Alhaji Akewusola, you need to move to Alausa. It is better for you to become a PS." and I told him that was my aspiration – to become and retire as Permanent Secretary. When you work with the CEOs, your thinking will change and you will understand the workings of the government. I once served as PA to LSDPC General Manager, Architect John-Bede Anthonio between 1999 and 2003. I was navigating between LSDPC and Alausa. I understood what it takes to be a PS and their weight at the time – and since that time I have been nursing that ambition.

When Iron Man made that suggestion, I didn't know how to go about it but when that man in his own wisdom sent me to Alausa. everything started becoming crystal clear. On another thought, I felt that it is the people who are destroying and disturbing the progress of LSDPC that are usually deployed to Alausa, so I resisted. When I refused the move, I started facing a lot of persecutions. He even ordered me to quit my

position as Head of Quantity Surveying but I kept fighting on until Governor Ambode heard about the issue and invited me to his office and guestioned what the problem was about. I told him I had no problem with the man but if he has any with me, he should say it. I also said, "Should anyone be aggrieved and complaining, that should be me."

I then told Governor Ambode about my secret desire to become a PS and I know that can only be possible at Alausa. He instructed me to write a transfer letter and addressed it to the Civil Service Commission. That was how I was honourably transferred to Alausa. I haven't seen the letter of interview requesting me to be at Alausa till date. It was one of the

officers who informed me that I was supposed to be in Alausa for an interview. I just begged him to photocopy the letter for me and he did.

When the result of my interview came out, they called me from the Civil Service Commission asking if they should send the letter or I would pick it up. I quickly told them I would pick it up.

I picked up my letter and the day I was to resume was the same day the present SSG, Mrs. Sherifat Jaji was retiring as HOS. On getting to Public Service Office, I was told 'Oga' was exiting on the same day and there was no serious work on that day. On getting home, I received a call to be at the Governor's Office by 8am the next day.

I was in the Governor's Office before the set time. On getting there, the CEO of LSDPC and the Accountant were also there. I hadn't informed him I was leaving LSDPC before then. I only posted my appreciation message on the notice board, thanking all the staff and bidding them farewell. We entered into Governor's reception hall and sat down, I just waved my hands at them. overheard the accountant telling him. "Mr. Akewusola has left us." He jerked into action and probed, "Mr. Akewusola, is it true that you have left us?" I replied yes.

"Where are you now?" He asked. I replied, "I came here to get my posting letter." I didn't tell him the Governor invited me to his office. noticed he was shocked but I cared less.

I didn't know that he and the accountant were also invited by the Governor and when the Governor beckoned, the GM led the way and I followed.

On entering Governor's office, the Governor asked the CEO, "When did you join the Civil Service?" He looked back and the Governor said. "Don't be ridiculous. Can't Lask you a question?"

Shivering, he answered 19 so-so. The Governor said, "Go and handover to Mr. Akewusola with immediate effect. I would have sacked you if not for the people pleading on your behalf."

The Governor then asked me to go to PSO and pick my transfer letter. He also instructed the accountant to update me accordingly.

That was how I became the Acting CEO of LSDPC from November 2015 to June 2016. After that, I was transferred to head New Towns Development Authority (NTDA) as General Manager. In June 2019, I was appointed as Permanent Secretary.

Can you brief us about your Alausa experience, your time at the Ministry of Housing? Let's start by comparing and contrasting activities at LSDPC and NTDA.

Let me first acknowledge the person who appointed me as a Permanent Secretary, the incumbent Governor of Lagos State, Mr. Babajide Olusola Sanwo-Olu. I was appointed in May, 2019, when the Governor was appointing his SSG. Chief of Staff and the first set of six Permanent Secretaries. Six (6) of us were sworn-in on June 6, and I was given the portfolio of Ministry of Housing. Before becoming a

Permanent Secretary, I was already integrated into full-fledged Civil Service protocol at New Towns Development Authority. Whilst LSDPC is an independent parastatal, NTDA is a mixture of parastatal and ministry. At LSDPC, all the members of staff are recruited by the parastatal. At NTDA, the members of staff are either recruited by the Authority or posted from the State Public Service Office.

The Ministry of Housing superintends over some parastatals like LSDPC, Lagos Mortgage Board popularly called LagosHOMS as well as Lagos State Real Estate Regulatory Authority (LASRERA). LSDPC generates its own revenue and plans its own expenditure except the Governor decides otherwise - therefore, decision making in the parastatal is fastest. NTDA on the other hand is a mixed breed. Some of their activities are scrutinized by the Ministry of Physical Planning and Urban Development and it also makes certain independent decisions. The Ministry is a different ball game entirely; everything must be closely scrutinized by the Ministry of Economic Planning and Budgeting. Payments have to be vetted by other MDAs such as Central Internal Audit and State Treasury Office. Activities at LSDPC are

the fastest, followed by NTDA. Making decision is very slow at

the Ministry and this delays planning and implementation process. At LSDPC, construction work of one year can be executed within the stipulated time. At NTDA, 12 months project can stretch to 18 months. But in the Ministry, that same project may not be completed in three years because of the bureaucracy in the system. My work at the Ministry started with projects that had been abandoned during the administration of former Governor of Lagos State, now Minister of Works and Housing, Mr. Raji Fashola. Meanwhile, revisiting abandoned

projects is costlier than starting afresh – and getting approval to start is another impediment. But God helped us and we were able to record substantial success. I thank God for his support, my teammates for their availability. I am



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also indebted to the Honourable Commissioner, Hon. Moruf Akinderu-Fatai; a man of integrity, a very different and uncommon political appointee. He handles every task like his personal projects. To excel in the Ministry, you must see the job as your own but most Civil Servants believe it is government's project. My team worked round the clock to ensure that many of the abandoned projects were commissioned. For example, Sangotedo Scheme of LagosHOMS was conceived during the time of Governor Raji Fashola – and it comprised of 1.188 units. It was abandoned for years but due to hard work and involvement of the functionaries at the Ministry of Housing, we completed and commissioned the first phase of the project comprising 744 homes. Others include Lateef Jakande Gardens, Igando; Abiodun Ogunleye Estate Igbogbo and Joint Venture schemes like Raji Fashola Estate Iponri and Lekki Phase 2 Scheme at Lekki, to mention a few. At NTDA, I saw that the agency was handling most of Lagos Housing projects and I realized that the core ministerial responsibilities of NTDA was not to build houses, but it was just competing unnecessarily with LSDPC and

Ministry of Housing. They are

I wrote a submission to Governor Ambode that NTDA was acting ultra vires and advised that all their projects be transferred to the Ministry of Housing, and the request was granted. Some members of staff of NTDA were angry with my decision but I made them see the reason why

The shocking part was that the projects I transferred to the Ministry of Housing were left untouched until my appointment as Permanent Secretary – and it was part of the responsibilities that I faced at the Ministry. Fortunately, to the glory of almighty Allah, we were able to deliver more than 15 schemes during my time despite the people's belief that it could not be possible to achieve such feat. I give kudos to my Honourable Commissioner, the

Directors and the Heads of Departments and Units, as well as the team of the Ministry of Housing that did a wonderful job.

Among all the schemes you were able to deliver as the PS; which one will you say is the best, or most outstanding?

We put our best into all the schemes. Iponri is a good project. Lekki Phase 2 is also good. Ibeshe is also outstanding and LK Garden at Igando is now a New London.

Which scheme is the most challenging?

LAGOSHOMS Sangotedo and LAGOSHOMS Odo-Onosa/Ayandelu at Agbowa were the most challenging. They are the two schemes that I can say were more challenging than the others but fortunately we surmounted the obstacles that we met on those schemes.

What legacy can you say you left behind at the Ministry of Housing?

Completing highest number of housing schemes is a legacy. Nobody has ever surpassed that one in the history of the Ministry of Housing.

What is your advice to the ones that will be taking over the ministry after you?

They shouldn't rest on their oars. We have set the base, and established the pace; they should surpass our record. They have to look forward to beating the odds.

When you were in the Ministry, have you mentored anyone to take after you ... anyone you can say is your protégé?

I have mentored all my directors and anyone of them can be the next PS. I want to tell you that they are well versed and they are good.

In all the posts you held at the top level; how were you able to resist the corruption that blindfolds public officers?

One of the things you have to resist in Civil Service is corruption. I spent 25 years at LSDPC; I have friends and enemies. To God be the glory, I did not have any collaboration with any staff of the parastatal to do any corrupt act. I have been resisting it since I was a junior officer. So, nobody could walk up to me when I became the CEO, (Oga e ranti b'a se n se ni) Don't you remember how we used to do it? The major weapon is contentment. What I was given as salary and the extra I made from consultancy are enough for me. I never at any time lived above my income. The salary wasn't too juicy but I was using consultancy to back it up and the contractors know that I will never ask them for a dime. There was a time an auditor went to crosscheck a valuation I did and discovered a mistake but instead of calling me to re-examine the job, he went straight to the Managing Director to report that he has caught 'a thief red-handed.' He believed I connived with the contractor to cheat the government. I was served a query to answer. I was so confused about the whole matter. I went back to review my valuation and I discovered that I had actually undervalued the project. It was like

the contractor should have been paid N20 million and I estimated his job to be N15 million. I picked up my pen and demanded that an external Valuer be hired to re-assess the job. It was done and the truth of undervaluation was discovered. My MD called me and the auditor and presented the report of the external Valuer to us. I walked up to the auditor and told him, "You should have at least called my attention before going to the MD." The MD implored me not to take it personal because the auditor was only doing his job. I could tell from the look of things that the auditor felt so embarrassed. He did what he did because some people had pushed him – and just as the MD suggested, I moved on with my life. So, at a time like this when someone is retiring and leaving the service without blemish, you won't be able to fully comprehend the reasons why he is dancing. Sometimes, it is because of indescribable events and terrible fire he had walked through. Nobody





will fully understand why I am so grateful to God. Indeed, it was Allah who kept me going throughout the troubles and challenges I faced.

What blueprint did you leave behind as the MD of LSDPC and GM of NTDA?

I spent 25 years at LSCPC; it was part and parcel of me. I know what was going wrong there and I know what to do to correct the anomalies. I restructured LSDPC

administratively and the structure I put in place is what they are still using to date. I had to merge some departments together to form one when I discovered they were not doing well.

When I took over, LSDPC was owing contractors about N500million due to what my predecessor did but between December and June when I was leaving, I left over HI.5 billion excess because of the restructuring I did.

My activities involved setting up a Task Force to recover debts and we recouped a lot of debts within that short period - and because it



worked for me, it was maintained till date.

In another segment, when you receive a promotion letter, it will state with immediate effect but my transfer letter to NTDA did not say with immediate effect. Instead, Gov. Ambode said your transfer becomes effective one month from today. You will not leave LSDPC immediately. You will have to put your successor through on how you were able to attain what you achieved because I love your work. It was this incumbent Governor, Mr. Babajide Sanwo-Olu that I handed over to. I told him why I did some of the things

I did and how to do them better. People did not like the changes I made but it paid the government greatly.

After I left, they were telling my successor, "That was not the way we were doing it; it was Akewusola that changed it." Mr. Sanwo-Olu told them, "If it was Akewusola that did it, leave it like this. It is beautiful and profitable."

You are a detailed, cultured and disciplined person – but you were seen as a wicked boss by some mischievous persons. How do you view yourself?

The fact of the matter is that there is no way you will want to effect a change that people will not be affected. It will affect some people positively and others negatively – and if your intention is to make everybody happy, you will not be happy yourself. Look at Almighty Allah, some people will say, "God is

good," while others will tell you, "God is partial or wicked." You cannot please everybody. People draw their conclusions based on their perspectives. So, if people tell you I am wicked; the question should be, "What prompted that statement ... what transpired between us that made him or her say such about me.?" I cannot be wicked to everybody because of a single person. It is not possible. People are guick at talking about your reaction without talking about their own actions that prompted the reaction. In this life, if you are a principled person - your friends will

> acknowledge you but your antagonists will latch onto it from a wrong perspective. You can term me a wicked person because I don't want other people to suffer in order to make you happy. All in all, however the people view me, I say Alhamdulillahi (Thanks to Allah).

In what way can you say you have contributed to your profession as a Quantity Surveyor?

I can say I have tried a lot. I was involved in the politics of the

profession and I served my way up to being a State Chairman and National Treasurer. I realised that any complaint at national level is the aggregate of complaint at individual level. When we are talking of corruption, bad leadership and other vices - ask yourself at your micro level, "What kind of person am I?" Whatever you see happening at the federal or national level is as a result of our activities at our micro level. Having contributed my quota, serving at different levels of my profession in both the state and national levels, I can tell you that the corruption everyone is talking about

For example, as a National Treasurer, I was supposed to be the Head of Treasury for the Association but I have this President then. who was so corrupt to the extent that he would sign a cheque and asked me to countersign. I began to ask, "Is it not the Treasurer that

has to sign first for the President to countersign?" – and when he discovered that I was not dancing to his corrupt drumming, he went to publish a full-page newspaper advert that I had been removed from being the National Treasurer in two national dailies. I withstood him; I went to court and fought him tooth and nail. I was still at LSDPC at the time and I cannot bear the libel. Had it been it was some other posts like Secretary or PRO, we may be quiet about it but as a

Treasurer acting against the law ... it means he is embezzling the Association' s money. I wouldn't let anyone drag my name in the mud. I would never allow palm-oil taint my white robe. Nobody can touch my reputation and I will just let it slide; that is impossible. I took them to court and won. I was vindicated. The court ruled that they should publish a rejoinder in three dailies and apologise to me officially. They went ahead and did the rejoinder in only one paper, Punch. They are still owing me two more publications of apology. What really happened at the time was that the Association wanted to conduct examination for potential professionals and they inflated the budget. I resisted that move. I wouldn't let them have their way. That was what made me their enemy. They now told the members that it was the Treasurer that was not releasing money for the exams to be conducted. They did not tell them what they did and the funny part is that I started getting text messages from junior colleagues, asking me if it was my father's money and some were saying that after I have qualified and made it in life, I was preventing them from excelling ... and some past presidents were even luring me to bend my ways and allow them to take whatever they want, that our tenure won't last more than two years – and I began to wonder, what kind of society are we living in.

UBA staff stole N400 million. How can the country stand when a whole lot is corrupt? I believe the only reason some elements consider me wicked is because I resist corruption.


Based on the enormity of persecution you faced in your profession; have you ever felt like leaving it for another profession or career?

Why do I have to run? It is the same thing everywhere and in every profession. Our people are generally corrupt. If I leave Quantity Surveying for any other profession, there are unscrupulous elements there who are trying to woo you into their nefarious activities and if you resist, they will tag you wicked or a bad team player. Leaving a profession for another is not a solution, it is just a means of escaping some set of individuals. Remember, I said I used to do private practice to augment my income but I can tell you that everywhere and everybody is corrupt. They will lure you into it and you would have fallen for their baits before you realise it. I'm grateful to God that nobody would say I have in one way or the other connived with him to manipulate figures – and I can tell you that I never thought of quitting my profession for another because of all the evils I have witnessed. Doing that will be like leaving Kirikiri prison for Ikoyi prison. Prison is prison anywhere.

What is your definition of integrity?

Integrity is your ability to stand on something that is true, something that is right, something that will affect people positively. Integrity is doing something selflessly; not cheating others and doing it for the benefits of all.

Who was your role model while growing



up?

I want to disappoint you; I don't have any.

Is there any professional that you look up to at a time in your life?

On a professional level, I want to give it to one of the past Presidents of the Nigerian Institute of Quantity Surveyors, Mr. Francis Adetola who actually invited me to come and become the National Treasurer when he was the sitting President of the institute and I was the Chairman of the Lagos State. At first, I rejected because I did not want to be going through the rigour of frequenting Abuja for meetings and some activities. I told him I am a public officer and I want to rest. He then said to me. "This my deputy that is going to man the Institute is not a man to be left to

chance without anybody checkmating him." The man stood by me from the beginning to the end of that court case. There was nobody in the whole of NIQS that supported me except him. After each court session, he always called and prayed for me.

I also received a call from one-time President, Mr. Femi Onashile, begging me to drop the case, that we should settle the matter out of court. He wanted us to resolve the case in his own tenure. I gave up for the settlement of the case because of him.

I had stopped going for NIQS meeting at the time because the entire system was infuriating. The people there believed I was wrong, that stealing fund was normal. Another person I respect for his fatherly role is Chief Odumosu, Mr. Onashile's cousin, who also called to beg me to drop the case and settle out of court. What I did when the defaming publication came out was to officially write a letter to LSDPC, informing them of my intention to go to court, that I will give them feedback on the outcome. I had already left LSDPC before the case ended but I wrote to them on the outcome of the case so that they can close the file.

Let's douse the tension a little and socialise. How did you meet your wife?

I have already told God that I wanted to get married at age 30 and I had met some other ladies before I met my wife. Before I would woo any lady, there were certain qualities that I was keen about. If I could not find it in them, I would gently withdraw without any rancour.

When I met my wife, she was a staff of Lagos Building Investment Company, (LBIC). She came to their office at LSDPC compound. We interacted as she was talking about an uncle of mine, my father's friend, Alhaji Animashaun Awelenje who was Director of Finance at LSDPC at the time. It was Alhaji Awelenje's father that taught my father how to read Quran - and Alhaji Awelenje used to joke that, "Your father learnt how to read Quran from my father and he taught me how to read the Quran." The first thing that drew me closer was that I thought she was related to Alhaji Awelenje but no. After speaking with her, I had the urge to move closer to her. She was not a Moslem and she did not have anything against my religion – and the rest is now history.

You are a devoted Moslem, father, husband and professional; how have you been able to function adequately in all these areas without one affecting the other?

When nature calls me to play a father's role, I leave behind my professional activities. The paramount one that coordinates my other activities or roles is my position as a Moslem. From there, I receive the guidance on how to be a husband, father and keep my home intact and it guides my daily activities as a human being and a professional. Islamic religion teaches me the way of life.

We are majorly religious in Nigeria and not godly. None of the religions we are practising in this country encourages us to do wrong thing ... Islam, Christianity or traditional practices are all against evil. Islamic religion directs the affairs of my life and guides my decision making as a husband, father, professional and so on. What you see me doing now is what I have been doing from inception. I never drank, smoked or womanised all my life. Religion helped some people against certain immorality but religion fuels my moral on a daily basis. It keeps adding to me. I will never do as a professional what my religion does not condone. My religion is the driver of my life.

How do you unwind?

I unwind with my family. I do not join any social club intentionally – I do not see any benefit in it. If you continually sit with friends who drink alcohol, you will be overwhelmed by their mockery and if you mingle with womanisers, they will make you look like an idiot by their sugar-coated mouths. The

What more do I want? I have served as State Chairman and National Treasurer, NIQS and I also served as State Chairman, Association of Professional Bodies. I want to give the youngsters room to do it – and assist them whenever I am called upon for professional counsel.

I don't want to be like our politicians who became objects of mockery because they refuse to quit the stage when the ovation was loudest.

What is your advice to the youths and coming generation?

My advice for them is to be diligent in whatever they do and ensure that corruption that is endemic is killed and flushed out of the system. They should be focused; nobody amounts to anything without focus. If they don't lose focus, they will reach their destinations quickly and their dreams will be actualized.

What do you want to be remembered for?

I will love to be remembered for my integrity during Service.
